## The Rector's Letter

Dear all,

Easter is at the absolute heart of the Christian faith and the most central time of the Church Year. We celebrate Easter every Sunday, as we meet on the first day of the week (the day of the resurrection) in worship and prayer. However, once a year we make a special effort in our Easter celebrations as we prepare ourselves during the Season of Lent and go through the drama of Holy Week through to Easter Day, recalling Jesus' last days before his death, his passion and resurrection. This year (as the restrictions due to the Covid pandemic are eased), we will manage a full round of services: from Jesus' entry into Jerusalem to the Last Supper and from the cross to the empty tomb (and quite a few services in between!). The worship of Holy Week is not just a re-telling of the central Christian story: it is designed so that we may enter into the narrative more fully and be touched on deeper levels with the help of all our senses. Christ is always risen, but we are to find our own step on the Christian Way and as we walk God's purpose for us. As we sing in our Lent Hymn this year:

From ashes to the living font  
your Church must journey still;  
through cross and tomb to Easter joy,  
in Spirit-fire fulfilled.

I am very much looking forward to walking this year's holy journey of Holy Week & Easter with you.

## Diocesan Synod 5th March 2022

The Diocesan Synod was held online again this year. It has been recorded and there will be information available on the Diocesan website soon. There was a lot of interesting content, some of which will take time to absorb. Bishop Ian gave a short but moving address as his charge to Synod. Rather than try to precis it here I will find ways of sharing it on our website. Dean Graham Taylor made everyone feel welcome and was thoughtful and uplifting in his homily during the Eucharist.

Brendan Grimley, Chair of the Administration Board gave a very clear account of the way in which the Diocese has been impacted, but is navigating, through the effects of the pandemic. This was reassuring and is underpinned by the strategy and ethos that the Diocese deploys in ensuring that charges are supported as a collective.

Discussion in breakout groups on the things that concern and the things that excite the different charges were illuminating. Not least because often what concerns also excites! There were a lot of commonalities in concerns for congregations as people adjust to the lifting of Covid-19 restrictions. The necessity to change the way charges worship and operate pastorally has brought about many new, often innovative, and refreshing approaches.

There was then report back from two groups, firstly one from the Diocesan Climate Change Group, and secondly a report on the new Ecumenical Project for a Pilgrim Pastor. A video was also shared talking about the joint working between the Stirling Presbytery and our own Area Council to explore the St Andrews Declaration. All these projects are interesting and energising. Videos of the Climate Change stories can be found on the Diocesan website, and it is hoped that the Pilgrim Pastor will be in post by the time the Diocesan pilgrimage takes place in September.

I think that it was at this point that the formal announcements were made, including the appointment of new Canons.

**Diocesan Synod 5th March 2022**

Rev Christoph Wutscher, and the Rev Elaine Garman were appointed. Details of their installation are on page 4.

We were taken through the consideration of the new liturgy from General Synod by Christoph and Rev Nerys Brown. The final part of the day was to consider the proposal “that Liliias Graham be included in the Scottish Episcopal Church Calendar on account of her faith-filled life and example”. Both the new liturgies and the inclusion of Liliias Graham to the SEC calendar were approved to be taken to General Synod for consideration.

Next Diocesan Synod takes place on 11<sup>th</sup> March 2023, and there will be consultation as to whether this will be online or in person.

I was born and brought up in Glasgow in the 1950s. Like many children living in a room & kitchen in an old tenement flat with a toilet on the landing that was shared with two other families, I didn't know I was deprived. When I was six we moved to Easterhouse, a peripheral council scheme which soon earned a reputation for teenage gangs and trouble. My sister and I knew nothing of that. For us it was like moving into the country. On a walk through nearby fields soon after moving there, we saw a calf being born. It was such a wonderful, novel experience for us.

I lived in various (more salubrious) parts of Glasgow all my life apart from a few years spent teaching in Madrid. I am still a loyal Glaswegian but in my retirement I moved to Stirling to be somewhere smaller and where the pace of life is much slower.

It is also a little nearer the West Highlands, my favourite part of Scotland. It has been a very successful move.

Part of that success has been finding Holy Trinity – a most welcoming community church – truly *open, inclusive, inspiring and friendly* as it says on the weekly pewsheet. What keeps me attending? The beauty of the building – the magnificent stained glass, the detailed reredos and screen. The church community is particularly blessed with gifted musicians in Alistair and Ulrike. I also appreciate Christoph's interpretation of Scripture. Music, art and architecture are not merely secular aspects of life – they help me access my spirituality. I now write poetry and organise poetry readings. If I had a two-minute sermon to preach it would be entitled *The Power of Poetry to Access Our Spirituality*.

Transition Stirling, in partnership with the Kitchen at 44, established Stirling Community Food in March 2020.

Now based at **5 Wellgreen Lane** in Stirling town centre, Stirling Community Food helps reduce food waste. Instead of supermarkets putting large volumes of excess and near-sell-by-date food in the bin, the project collects this excess food and offers it to everyone in the community for

free. Customers can collect many fresh bakery goods, frozen foods and flowers, as well as a variety of fresh fruit and vegetables. Food is currently being sourced from the Stirling branches of Marks & Spencer, Sainsbury's, Tesco, Aldi, Lidl and Morrisons. Please spread the word about this service. You might not need it yourself but may know someone who does.



## Eulogy for Mary Cooper 1918-2022

Mary was born in Salisbury Cottage, Blairforkie Drive, Bridge of Allan on 19 April 1918, the third eldest in a family of four boys and two girls, blissfully unaware that WW1 was still raging.

Her parents were Hugh Burns McIntosh, a photographer with Ramsay Studios in Union Street, Bridge of Allan and Mary Winter from Guildtown, Perthshire.

Mary and her siblings enjoyed an idyllic childhood playing in the

woods at the back of the cottage, where they kept pigeons, hens, two cats and a vegetable plot.

Mary was school dux at Bridge of Allan Primary School. Instead of receiving a medal she was asked to select books and she chose a selection from Dickens, the Brontes and R. D. Blackmore. She was also a keen Burns fan and won a medal for verse speaking in Glasgow. She went on to Riverside School, attaining her Higher School Leaving Certificate.

To supplement the family's income, before school she would go round Bridge of Allan on the milk cart and helped out at the Buttercup Dairy on a Saturday.

During World War Two she remained on the home front, as all her siblings had either joined the forces, or in her eldest brother, Hugh's case, the Ministry. She worked in Welsh & Robb, Solicitors, who were based at that time in Barnton Street, Stirling.

In her spare time, along with her sister Margaret, she sang in St Saviour's Church Choir and was, like her sister, a good Scottish country dancer.



After Welsh & Robb she moved to Stirling County Council where she met my father, Gordon Grant Cooper. In April 1958 they married and I came along the following March. She didn't return to work, but became a full-time mother and housewife.

Also in 1958, she joined this Church and remained a regular attender for the rest of her life. She led the Women's Fellowship, was a Sunday School teacher, ran the coffee mornings and fairs and was particularly noted for the feeling she put into her readings. This was a product of her love of poetry.

After dad died in 2003, I took her on coach holidays to continental Europe, the Channel Islands, North Wales and even a Beatles-themed trip in Liverpool. When mum was 100, David and I took her to the Lake District, so that she could reminisce about her honeymoon there in 1958.

Mum was a keen SWRI member, rising to President of Blair Drummond SWRI. We had many good nights there, seeing all kinds of different demonstrations and the annual Charity Whist Drive was a big highlight.

It was great that mum lived long enough to attend my wedding in 2012. In 2016, at the age of 98, she came with us to the Isle of Lewis to witness the wedding of her grand-niece Fiona. In 2019 at the age of 101 she made her final trip to Lewis to meet her 10-month old great grand-niece, Grace.

Mum kept very good health up until a couple of years ago. She had a lovely 100<sup>th</sup> birthday party with family and friends and some smaller parties with her friends at the North Parish Church Tuesday group, Stirling Literary Society, her own fellow church goes here at Holy Trinity and even Waitrose! She was also asked, along with another lady, to officially reopen the bridge on Kerse Road over the railway line.

She will be much missed by her family and by all who she came into contact with.

## **Saints and Heroes of the Faith to inspire our prayers in April**

2nd, St. Francis of Paola, born in 1416, at Paola in Calabria, he attracted many followers by his piety and holiness. He founded a congregation of hermits, which became the Franciscan Minim Friars. He lived in a Friary for a year when he was 13 and went on pilgrimage to Assisi and Rome, becoming a hermit near his own town living in a cave overlooking the sea. At the age of 20 he was joined by two companions. Later, others came to join them and they were called Minims through their humility. They were approved by the Holy See in 1474. He died at Tours in France in 1507.

5th, St. Vincent Ferrer, born at Valencia in Spain, in 1350. He joined the Dominican Order in 1367 at the age of 17, teaching and preaching until he was forty. Then from 1399 to 1409 he began to travel extensively, particularly in France, but also in Switzerland and Germany, preaching and exhorting people to the faith. He died at Vannes in Brittany in 1419, and was canonised in 1455.

21st, St. Anselm, born in Piedmont in 1033, Anselm entered the Benedictine Order at the monastery of Le Bec in France, where he taught theology. He became Archbishop of Canterbury, in England, in 1093, and fought strenuously for the freedom of the Church from temporal power. He was a man of great holiness and his writings, particularly in mystical theology, are renowned. Accordingly he was made a Doctor of the Church.

29<sup>th</sup>, St. Catherine of Siena, Virgin, and Doctor of the Church since 1970, was born at Siena in 1347. She became a member of the Order of St. Dominic. She was filled with an active love for God and neighbour; she strove to bring peace to the quarrelling factions and cities of Italy, and to restore the rights of the papacy, at that time in exile in Avignon. She was a contemplative and ascetic, and her many writings are remarkable for their spirituality and theology. She suffered a stroke on the 21<sup>st</sup> April 1380 and died 8 days later. She was canonised in 1461.


