## The Rector's Letter

Dear all,

The month of May will be a time of focus on the Holy Spirit for us at Holy Trinity: on the last Sunday of the month, we'll celebrate the Feast of Pentecost, recalling the gift of the Holy Spirit inspiring and strengthening the Church. The week before, on Sunday 21<sup>st</sup> May, Bishop Ian will be with us to lead a Service of Confirmation at HT, invoking the gift of the Holy Spirit on our confirmation candidates by the laying on of hands and the anointing with chrism oil. Both of these occasions (and the days in between) will form a kind of 'mini-season' of the Holy Spirit, reminding us of the importance of the presence of the Holy Spirit in our lives and in our discipleship.

The Holy Spirit is key to our lives: as a comfort and strength; as inspiration and guide; as creative force or loving presence.

How does the Holy Spirit show in your life? In 'gut-feeling' or signs? In inspiration or strength for a task at hand? What does the presence of the Spirit mean to you in everyday life?

In whatever way the Spirit shows, one thing is important to remember: the presence of the Holy Spirit will always be bigger than we can fathom or imagine. The Spirit cannot be caged in! As Christ says in John's Gospel: 'The wind blows where it chooses, and you hear the sound of it, but you do not know where it comes from or where it goes. So it is with everyone who is born of the Spirit.' (John 3.8)

In this sense, I wish you a freeing and deep Spirit-led season.

## HT Flourishing Future Group

Many of you will be aware that over the last few months, the *Green Action Group*, has been working on its strategy *that ensures the environment is embedded in our faith, decision making and activity*. The strategy aligns with the Provincial Strategy to deliver net zero by 2030. The strategy was presented to and accepted by the HT Vestry on the 13<sup>th</sup> March 2023. As the strategy becomes embedded, we also agreed a name change from the *Green Action Group* to the *Flourishing Future Group*. This change moves us away from the idea that a 'group' will do all the 'green action' to one that will involve us all in delivering a flourishing future for HT, the wider church and community.

The land surrounding our Church and its buildings is a key asset that we can use to address some of our environmental challenges, including the promotion of biodiversity, community value and the capture of carbon. We are hugely grateful to Jim and Brian Shanks who over many decades meticulously maintained the Church and its land. We now need to consider how we take forward the management of the land surrounding the Church, whilst also addressing the net zero challenge. In the meantime, we have initiated a discussion with Tree Link Stirling and On the Verge. We have agreed to participate in *No Mow May*, which is a campaign initiated by PlantLife (<https://www.plantlife.org.uk>), and will allow us to assess what our grassed areas have to offer in terms of floral diversity, and the benefit this may have to insect life and biodiversity. This will explain why the grassed areas may look a little unkempt during the month of May. We will report back our findings.

## One in five people find common noises “intolerable”

Do some common noises really bother you? If you hate everyday sounds like chewing, sniffing and even moderate breathing, then you may be among the one in five people in Britain who suffer from misophonia.

In the first study of its kind, researchers from King’s College London and University of Oxford have discovered that 18.4 per cent of the general UK population say certain noises can leave them feeling ‘trapped’ and ‘upset’.

Misophonia is a psychological condition in which common sounds made in normal life trigger more than the occasional irritation. Instead, they can trigger a fight or flight response, sparking real anger and even panic.

Clinical psychologists say that while most people dislike the sound of loud chewing, slurping, snoring and loud breathing, people with misophonia frequently react badly to even normal breathing, footsteps and swallowing.

When I was six years old, I announced that I wanted to teach dancing (I adored my ballet teacher) and never wavered although sent to boarding school for a “rounded” education! However, when he saw how determined I was, my father always supported me in running my own business. I trained at the Scottish Ballet School and in London for ballroom dancing. The height of my stage career during training was being a windmill “en pointe” dressed in sackcloth during a performance of Don Quixote! I preferred teaching.

Music has always been vital in my life and I love especially the Mozart Clarinet Concerto. I love visiting the theatre, with a highlight trip being

an outdoor performance in the Verona arena of a magical blue & silver Aida - during a thunderstorm. It lasted until 2am with the Grand March played twice through as the orchestra had to keep running for cover in the rain!

Peter and I were both IAMRoadSmart and Royal Society for the Prevention of Accidents Advanced Drivers, helping others to pass the tests.

My greatest regret is tripping up stone steps resulting in a shattered shoulder which forced me to retire from teaching dance aged eighty three! My motto now is "be not anxious or afraid" - not always easy.
