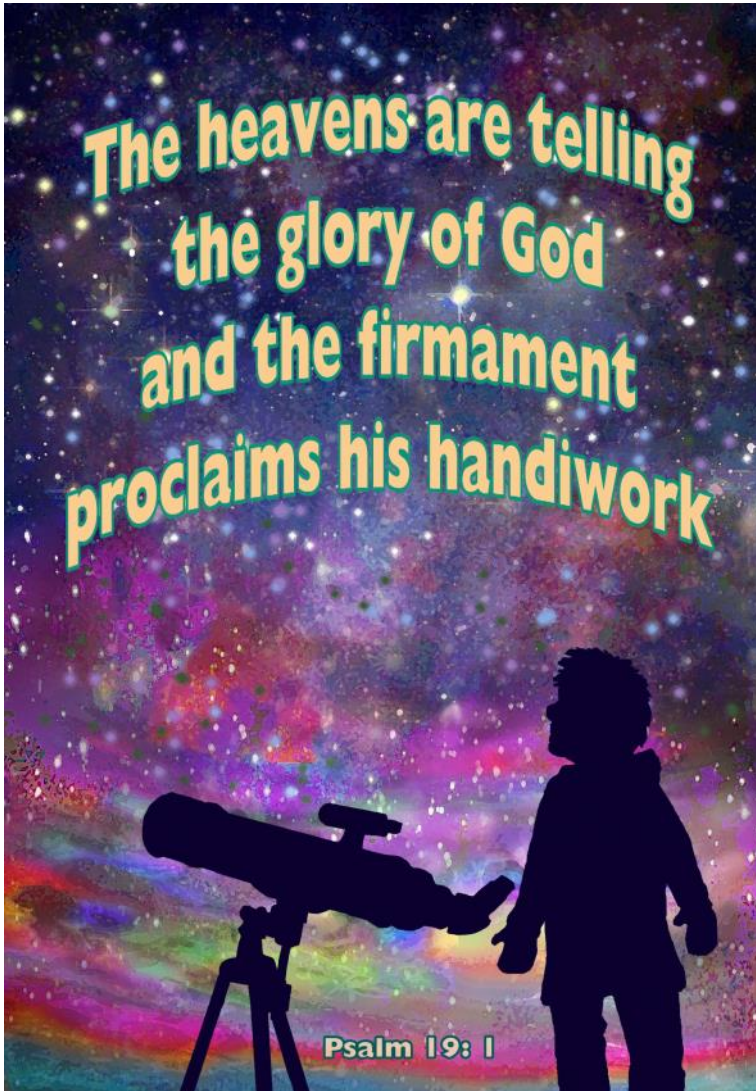

The Rector's Letter

Dear all,

In the Book of Numbers (the 4th Book in the Bible) we find a beautiful and profound benediction sometimes used in worship at the time of blessing. I remember once using it when leading a service of Holy Communion in the lounge of a nursing home. One resident and her visitor (who happened to be there at the time) did not partake in communion, but looked up with faces lit as I said those words. When I spoke to them after the service, they said they recognised those words from attending their local synagogue. It turned out, I even knew their Rabbi! It is wonderful to know that these words of blessing transcend even religious boundaries as true blessings probably always do. May those words bless you this summer and may you find ways of blessing others, be that with words or without. In Numbers we read:

The LORD spoke to Moses, saying: ²³Speak to Aaron and his sons, saying, Thus you shall bless the Israelites: You shall say to them,

The LORD bless you and keep you;

²⁵the LORD make his face to shine upon you, and be gracious to you;

²⁶the LORD lift up his countenance upon you, and give you peace.

(Numbers 6.22-26)

Towards 2028 and a Flourishing Future....

The Vestry meeting in May heard about the development of thinking as we start to refresh our strategic plan, which you might remember was focussed on 2028; our 150th anniversary.

It is our intention to progress thinking and discussion around three main areas over the summer, with a view to bringing ideas and feedback to the Annual Congregational Meeting in September. This can weave together many things that have been developing and growing so that we can think about our 'Flourishing Future' as a church.

The three areas are:

- Our Mission
- Our Buildings and land
- Open Church

A major input to our thinking has been the Provincial Net-Zero Plan. Contact has been made with Dr Bethany Nelson (Net Zero Empowerment Coordinator) who has recommended a series of 3 seminars looking at our Energy Usage, Buildings (both fabric and usage) and Community involvement. The aim is to inform the group on potential ways forward and key steps that will need to be addressed.

Some activities are being kicked off right now, so, if you start to hear things being talked about, please do participate – or if you have any ideas, or thoughts please do let a member of the Vestry know and they will be pleased to talk it through with you.

HT Garden Group Update

Progress

- Front bed near front wall now planted with Lavender Hidcote plants
- Bed for Bees prepared for planting by end of May
- Walking path marked out through the grass which will be kept mown
- All current flower beds near both entrance roadways weeded and pruned
- Garden shed cleared out to provide good storage space and back area at entrance to former boiler room tidied up
- Pebbled area at foot of church wall kept free of the odd stray weed
- Marking of boundary of garden at right hand entrance roadway with low wooden fence

Free Wood Chip Mulch

There is a large quantity of wood chip mulch available next to the Garden Shed (on the right hand side of the church building). If you would like to have some for your own garden, please feel free to bring your own bags (maximum of 3) and give a donation to our Garden Fund directly to David Brown. This should be kept for at least a year before spreading to allow the sap to die off. Otherwise your plants will burn!

Can you help Coco?

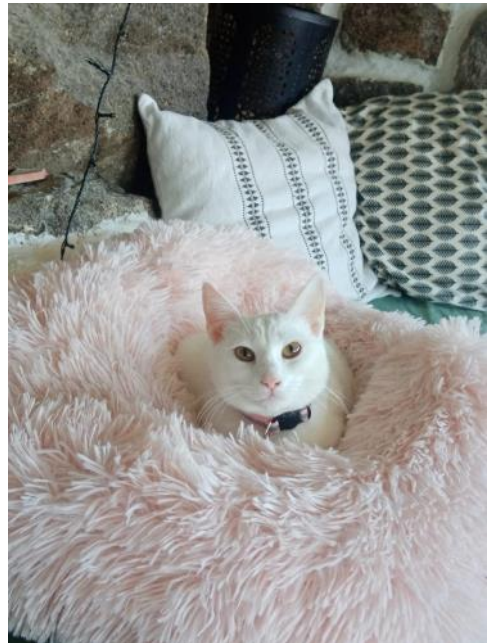
Would anybody be willing and able to adopt a one year old Greek cat with special needs?

Coco is deaf and blind and has a broken tail, likely a birth injury, that does not cause her any trouble. She navigates her surroundings using her senses of smell and touch and her whiskers. Coco is sweet natured, affectionate, gutsy and clever but she would need to be an "only cat" as other cats have attacked her.

Currently living on the island of Poros, she is one of many cats taken in by Trisha, who is a personal friend of my sister. Trisha has worked for many years both alone and with the support of charities to feed, neuter and rehome the stray cats of Poros. The cats are given medical attention when needed and the most vulnerable, of which Coco is one, stay in Trisha's own home. Due to her husband's illness and increasing care needs, Trisha is actively trying to rehome some of the cats who live with her. Given Coco has to live apart from the others, she is a priority. My sister would have taken Coco herself, had she not already adopted another of Trisha's rescue cats.

Coco has had the necessary vaccinations for travel and her paperwork is up to date. Some help with the cost of transport may be available.

Coco is small and white with lemony-yellow eyes. More pictures and videos are available. I think she would be a delightful companion for someone able to provide her with a loving forever home and an appropriate environment for her needs. *Claire Brims*

A cheery story to begin this month about public opinions on church heritage. A new opinion poll shows that 81% of European citizens agree that the preservation of Europe's historic places of worship is key for their community's present and future. The opinion poll was commissioned by Future for Religious Heritage (FRH), the European network for the protection and promotion of historic places of worship that has been advocating for the appreciation of the cultural, historical and artistic value of religious sites for over a decade.

Indeed, we continue to advocate that churches are an integral part of the community and this was the purpose they were always intended for. We have certainly seen a resurgence of this in the last few years with churches opening and being accessible on many more days of the year in addition to Sunday worship. Communities have benefitted greatly from regular activities such as Bible study, prayer groups, Scouts and Guides, ceilidhs, bingo, concerts, jumble sales, afternoon teas and much, much more.

As summer approaches, churches are also opening their gardens as a peaceful place to sit and contemplate. Indeed, this may be a community

Contacting an old friend can be nerve-wracking

Have you been wondering about an old friend with whom you have lost contact? Do you feel a bit hesitant about contacting them again?

You are not alone.

It seems that rekindling an old friendship can be as nerve-

racking as speaking to a stranger, according to the findings of a recent study by the University of Sussex.

The study found that although nine in ten of us have lost touch with an old friend, and although we would greatly welcome a message from them, we personally feel nervous about making the first move.

The most common reasons are fear that the old friend might not want to hear from us, that it would be 'too awkward after all this time', and that we feel guilty that we had not been in touch before.

But Dr Gillian Sandstrom, a psychologist and Director of the Sussex Centre for Research on Kindness, said that the people who pushed past their hesitation and did reach out to an old friend reported feeling happier.

She said that past research suggests that old friends appreciate you reaching out, even more than you expect.
